


DISCOVERY


SECOND TERM


2ND TERM




Cambridge O-Level

PARENT'S ORIENTATION EVENING




EXTENSION LESSONS with Mr. Grant

It operates in 129 countries and territories, helping to inspire millions of young people. And although the Award's framework remains the same wherever it is delivered, no two Awards are the same. Instead, each young person designs and creates their own bespoke programme, unique to them.

8 of our students, with the support of staff members have been working on the requirements to attain the bronze award for a 6-month period, working on a minimum of 3 months of community service, physical fitness, and learning a new skill, with an extra 3 months of one of the above. The last step is the "Adventurous Journey", which requires walking or another form of constant physical activity for 2 days and a night of camping outdoors in a group. This

year, the students chose to hike 20 km down from Petrin to Petite Rivière Noire carrying their required kit needed for the journey. After much effort and a lot of fun, they finally arrived at the camp site. There they set up tents and prepared their cooking fires for supper at the Nullatamby's who kindly welcomed the campers in their yard. They had a great time together even though it was a real challenge.
